

Captain Kenneth Washburn Hines of San Diego, California, was born in Newport, R. I., and attended the University of California where he was a member of the NROTC and from which he was graduated and commissioned an Ensign, USNR in 1934. Prior to active duty in the Navy, Captain Hines was an estimating engineer for the Hawaiian Electric Company in Honolulu, T. H.

During World War II, Captain Hines served on board the U.S.S. MINNEAPOLIS (CA-36) and the U.S.S. ST. PAUL (CA-73). He participated in the Battle of Coral Sea, the Battle of Midway, the Guadalcanal-Tulagi Landings, the Battle of Eastern Solomons, the Gilbert and Marshall Island Operations, the Marianas Operation, the capture of Palau Islands and many other Pacific Operations. Captain Hines wears the Asiatic Pacific Campaign Medal with 14 battle stars, the Commendation Ribbon, the China Service Medal and five other ribbons.

Following World War II Captain Hines attended the General Line School at Newport, R. I., in 1946-47. In 1947 he was given command of the U.S.S. H. A. BASS (APD-124) and served on board for one year. In 1948 Captain Hines was appointed Executive Officer of the U.S.S. NEW KENT (APA-217). Following his tour of sea duty he was Executive Officer at the U.S. Naval Ammunition Depot at Crane, Indiana in 1949-1950. In 1950 he was Inspector Instructor Naval Reserve, Grand Rapids, Michigan and in January 1951 he was given command of the U.S.S. BORDELON (DDR-881). During the period from November 1952 to May 1954 Captain Hines served in the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations, Washington, D. C. Captain Hines relieved Captain R. R. Pratt as Commander Destroyer Division 222 on 3 July 1956.

Captain Hines was married on March 7, 1946 to the former Clara Lucille Shaeffer of Lancaster, Ohio. They have one child

Patricia Ann, who is nine years old.

CDR, Harold Woodall BIESEMEIER, U.S. Navy, graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy in June,

In July, 1940 he reported for duty aboard the U.S.S. PORTLAND (CA-33). His next duty found him aboard the U.S.S. TOPEKA (CL-67). From the TOPEKA he went to the U.S.S. SAN FRANCISCO (CA-28).

Among his decorations are Navy Unit Citation, Asiatic Pacific Theatre Medal with fifteen battle stars, American Defense Medal, American Theatre Medal, World War II Victory Medal, Navy Occupation Medal with Asia clasp, China Service Medal

and the National Defense Medal.

After the war, he attended George Washington University in Washington, D.C. and graduated with a Bachelor of Laws Degree in May, 1949. From law school he went to the U.S.S. HARRY F. BAUER (DM-26). His next tour of duty was Flag Secretary for COMINLANT, then he was assigned to the Office of the Judge Advocate General in Washington, D.C. In December, 1955 he relieved CDR. R. W. McINTOSH, USN, as Commanding Officer of the U.S.S. AULT (DD-698).

#### U.S.S. AULT DD-698

U.S.S. AULT (DD-698) is a Sumner Class Destroyer, Commissioned in May 1944. The 2200 ton ship has an action-filled war time history which earned for her five battle stars in the Pacific during World War II.

AULT was one of the ships present in Tokyo Bay when the surrender document was signed on 2

September 1945.

AULT made her first Mediterranean cruise in

1951.

The ship returned to familiar places when she started a seven months' World cruise in November, 1953. Operations off Japan and Korea were in order until April, at which time she started for home by way of Hong Kong, Singapore, Ceylon, Port Said, Greece, Italy, Southern France, Spain and Gibraltar, arriving in Norfolk on 6 June 1954.

During the most recent Mediterranean cruise, the AULT sailed far and wide. Leaving Norfolk on 1 May 1956, she journeyed to the island of Rhodes, and then to Istanbul, Turkey. AULT was then selected to represent the U.S. at "Kiel Week" in Kiel, Germany. Returning to the Mediterranean, she stopped briefly in Naples and then began her six weeks' sojourn in the Red Sea and Persian Gulf area.



Graduated from the U. S. Naval Academy in 1939 and ordered for duty on U.S.S. YORKTOWN, an Aircraft Carrier. After a year and a half on board, he volunteered for submarine duty. From 1941 to 1946 he served on submarines progressing from junior officer to commanding officer. During the war years he made a total of nine war patrols in submarines and received two Silver Stars, a Bronze star and two Letters of Commendation for his performance of duty.

After the war Commander Benitez was selected for a Post Graduate course in Laws at Georgetown University, Washington, D. C.

In 1950, Commander Benitez reported to Washington as Head of the Foreign Training Branch in the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations. In 1952 he was ordered as Chief of the U. S. Naval Mission to Cuba. After two years in Havana, Commander Benitez reported for duty as Operations Officer in U.S.S. IOWA. In August 1954 he was detached from IOWA and subsequently ordered to command WALDRON.

#### U.S.S. WALDRON DD-699

The launching of the U.S.S. WALDRON took place in

Kearney, New Jersey, on 26 March 1944. WALDRON did not have long to wait for action. The year 1945 was to be a busy one for the ship. During January, VADM Mitcher's famed Task Force 58 carried out the first strikes against the Island of Formosa. WALDRON was a unit of that Task Force.

A major event during February was the ramming and sinking of a Japanese picket boat while strikes against Tokyo Bay

were being held.
August 1945, the month that the free world had long prayed and hoped for, saw WALDRON proudly steaming alongside the U.S.S. MISSOURI. Its mission: to be present during the acceptance of the Unconditional Surrender of the Japanese.

The year 1946 was spent operating with destroyer forces. Training was the primary mission.

New Orleans was to be the home port for the ship in 1947. During that year much time was spent in training Reserves.

The summer of 1952 found WALDRON proceeding to Europe, but this time with Midshipmen on board for their regular summer cruise. WALDRON completed this enjoyable period in September, and after brief repairs to her engines spent the remainder of the year in anti-submarine warfare activities off the Atlantic coast.

In 1953, WALDRON once again entered the Navy yard in Charleston, S.C. for extensive overhaul, thence, in June, to



Guantanamo Bay for refresher training and back to Norfolk to

prepare for extended duty in the Far East.
On the 16th of November WALDRON departed for Japan. During her stay n Japan, WALDRON operated with Pacific Ocean Anti-submarine Forces and as part of the United Nations Security Forces.

Early in April CDR. Fay E. Wilsie, USN, relieved CDR. Cunningham as Commanding Officer, and immediately there

after commenced her voyage home to Norfolk.

In July 1955 she entered the Norfolk Naval Shipyard for her regular overhaul.

On completion of her overhaul, WALDRON again proceeded to Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, for refresher training. It was during this period that WALDRON set a record score of 90.1% for the shore bombardment exercises all ships regularly conduct at Culchra Island, just off the east coast of Puerto Rico.

Prior to returning to the United States, WALDRON again had a change of Command Ceremony. This occurred at San Juan, Puerto Rico, where CDR. Wilsie was relieved by CDR. Rafael C. Benitez, USN

April again found WALDRON preparing for distant duty and on 1 May the ship got underway for a tour of duty with the United States Sixth Fleet in the Mediterranean. After four and a half month of operating WALDRON returned during the middle of September to her berth at Norfolk.

The ship is once more operating as a unit of the Atlantic Fleet - ready as ever to fulfill her mission.





CDR. Leonard ERB began his naval career in 1938 when he entered the United States Naval Academy. Upon graduation in December of 1941 he served in the U.S.S. DECATUR (DD-341) until February, 1943.

After completion of Submarine School in June of 1943 he was assigned to the U.S.S. RAY (SS-271). For his services aboard the RAY he was twice awarded the Silver Star and Bronze Star Medals and received a Letter of Commendation. From January until June of 1946 he served as Commanding Officer of the RAY.

During the period from June 1946 to June 1949, CDR. ERB was engaged in advanced studies in the field of Ordnance Engineering. Upon completion of this schooling he received his Masters of Science Degree from Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

In June of 1949 he returned to sea duty as Executive Officer of the U.S.S. SIRAGO (SS-485). On 8 June 1950, CDR. ERB assumed command of the U.S.S. REQUIN (SS-481).

In the summer of 1952 he was ordered to the Bureau of Ordnance. During his two and one half year tour in the Bureau of Ordnance he was engaged in directing research and development programs in the field of atomic weapons.

It was from duty in the Bureau of Ordnance that Commander ERB was assigned to the Destroyer Force of the Atlantic Fleet and came to the U.S.S. HAYNSWORTH (DD-700) as Commanding Officer to relieve CDR, W. D. BAKER in January of 1955.

#### U.S.S. HAYNSWORTH DD-700

The U.S.S. HAYNSWORTH (DD-700) is a 2200 ton destroyer, commissioned 22 June 1944. As with other destroyers, our main jobs are tracking and destroying submarines, escorting convoys, conducting smoke bombardment, and destroying enemy ships and aircraft.

On 30 December 1944 the HAYNSWORTH joined the

Third Fleet as part of Task Group 38.2.
On 6 September 1949 The HAYNSWORTH departed Norfolk, Va., for a "MED Cruise." Upon her return on 17 May 1950 she was placed out of commission in reserve. Less than three months latter, on 3 August 1950, reactivation work was started, and the ship was recommissioned 22 September 1950. On 3 September 1951 the HAYNSWORTH departed Norfolk for duty with the Sixth Fleet in the Mediterranean. The Haynsworth returned home in February, 1952.

The HAYNSWORTH on 2 November 1953 accompanied by ships of Destroyer Division 222, U.S.S. AULT, U.S.S. WEEKS, U.S.S. WALDRON, left the United States for a seven month World Cruise including a four month tour of duty in the Far East. The four months in the Seventh Fleet was devoted to

On 6 April 1954 the HAYNSWORTH departed Sasebo, Japan on the homeward bound leg of the World Cruise, crossing the equator on 20 April 1954 south of Singapore, and returning home in June, 1954. The World Cruise was seven months in length and fourteen countries were visited.

Early in March, 1956 the destroyer division including the HAYNSWORTH commenced and extended maintenance and repair period in preparation for the present tour of duty as part of the Sixth Fleet in the Mediterranean Sea, returning 23 September 1956.



Commander Joseph M. Parsons, USN, Commanding Officer of the U.S.S. JOHN W. WEEKS (DD-701) is a native of Michigan having been born in Grand Rapids on 4 February 1920.

He attended local schools in Michigan and entered the United States Naval Academy with a congressional appointment in 1938.

Upon graduation and commissioning in 1942, Commander Parsons reported to the U.S.S. ROE (DD-418). His tour of duty there lasted until April of 1944 at which time he was ordered to Post Graduate School at the Naval Academy and Cornell University for Ordnance training.

Commander Parsons received his M.S. in Engineering from Cornell in 1946. His next tour of duty was aboard the U.S.S. STRIBLING (DD-867) as Executive Officer, following by duty aboard the U.S.S. EPPERSON (DDE-719) also as Executive Officer. This was followed by assignment to the Bureau of Ordnance until January of 1954, at which time he went aboard the U.S.S. NEW JERSEY (BB-62) as Operations Officer.

Commander Parsons assumed command of the U.S.S. JOHN W. WEEKS (DD-701) on 19 September 1955.

He is authorized to wear the following medals: American Defense Service Medal; American Theatre Campaign Medal; Asiatic-Pacific Theatre Campaign Medal; European-African Campaign Medal; World War II Victory Medal; Occupation Medal; and National Service Defense Medal.

#### U.S.S. WEEKS DD-701

Built as a 2200-ton ALLEN M. SUMMER class destroyer, May, 1944.

On 21 July 1944, the vessel was placed in full commission as U.S.S. JOHN W. WEEKS (DD-701) in a commissioning ceremony at the Brooklyn Navy Yard, New York.

Throughout WW-II the WEEKS operated in the Pacific

Throughout WW-II the WEEKS operated in the Pacific theatre as a unit of Task Group 38 and 58. She took part in the landings on Iwo Jima and Okinawa, and participated in many of the air strikes on the Japanese mainland.

On 30 December 1945 the WEEKS cleared the Japanese area, and after a few brief stops steamed under the Golden Gate Bridge into San Francisco Harbor on 20 January. On 2 February she got under way on orders to the Atlantic Fleet, arriving at Norfolk, Va. on the 19th.

The ship departed from Norfolk in September, 1949 for a

The ship departed from Norfolk in September, 1949 for a tour of European duty. Upon returning from Europe the following spring, she was ordered to the "Mothball" fleet.

WEEKS was recommissioned in October, 1950.

She departed for Yokosuka, Japan on 3 November. She remained four months in the Japanese-Korean area during which time she operated with Task Force 77 off Korea, took part in anti-submarine exercises in the Philippine Sea, and a



number of lessor exercises and patrols. The homeward journey began on 5 April.

Enroute home visits were made to Hong Kong, Singapore, Colombo, and Aden. WEEKS also visited the Mediterranean ports of Athens, Naples, Genoa, Nice, Barcelona and Gibralter. She arrived in Norfolk on 4 June 1954.

During the winter and spring of 1956 WEEKS operated with Anti-Submarine forces, Atlantic Fleet, participating in several task group exercises. She also made recreational visits to Havana, Port Everglades and Jacksonville. Following a month of preparation, she departed for Mediterranean duty the first of May, 1956.

While with the Sixth Fleet the WEEKS operated as a part of a fast carrier task force, her primary mission being Anti-Submarine Warfare. Liberty ports visited while in the Med were Rhodes (an island belonging to Greece); Istanbul, Turkey; Kiel, Germany; Naples, Italy; Palma, Mallorca (an island belonging to Spain); and Gibralter (British Crown Colony). During the four months tour the WEEKS spent 35 days in the Red Sea-Persian Gulf area. It was during this 35 days that President Nasser of Egypt nationalized the Suez Canal.
